CHAPTER 1 What Is a Medical Courier?

A medical courier is a specialized delivery driver who transports time-sensitive and often regulated items for healthcare organizations. Unlike standard package delivery, medical couriers operate in an environment where accuracy, confidentiality, and speed can directly impact patient outcomes.

Part-time (4–5 hrs/day)	\$80 – \$150/day
Full-time solo driver	\$200 – \$350/day
STAT run specialist	\$300 – \$500/day
Multi-driver operation (2–3 drivers)	\$600 – \$1,200+/day

These figures reflect real-world earning ranges for couriers with established routes and contracts. Your results depend on your market, your hustle in the early days, and the systems you put in place.

- Basic supplies: coolers, specimen bags, temperature loggers

CHAPTER 4 A Day in the Life

Understanding the rhythm of the work helps you decide if this is right for you — and how to structure your operation from the start.

A Typical Morning Route

1. Pre-route check: Vehicle inspection, cooler temps verified, supplies loaded
2. First pickups: Lab specimens collected from clinic draw sites (timed, critical)
3. Chain-of-custody: Each specimen logged with time, temp, and recipient info
4. Deliveries: Drop at receiving lab, get signature, photo confirmation
5. STAT alert: Urgent pickup comes in — you respond, reroute, earn the premium rate
6. End of route: Digital paperwork filed, mileage logged, client invoiced

Most full-time couriers complete their primary routes in the morning and take STAT or pharmaceutical runs in the afternoon. Evenings can include urgent care and after-hours pharmacy work.

What Makes a Great Medical Courier

- Punctuality — healthcare timelines are non-negotiable
- Attention to detail — documentation errors can cost you a contract
- Professionalism — you are representing your clients inside medical facilities
- Discretion — patient information stays private, always
- Reliability — clients build their workflows around you

If you bring these qualities to the work, you will build a reputation that generates referrals faster than any marketing campaign.

CHAPTER 5 The Business Side — How the Money Actually Works

Medical courier work isn't just a job — it's a business. Understanding the financial structure from day one is what separates operators who build wealth from drivers who stay stuck trading hours for dollars.

Three Ways to Structure Your Income

- **Per-Run Pricing: Charge per pickup/delivery. Great for early clients. Simple to quote.**
- **Monthly Route Contracts: A recurring fee for a defined route. Predictable income. The goal.**
- **Mileage + Stop Hybrid: Common with larger clients who want flexibility.**

Business Structure Basics

Most solo medical couriers operate as sole proprietors or LLCs. An LLC (like Safe and Sound Couriers LLC) provides liability protection and looks more credible to healthcare clients.

You'll also want to understand:

- Self-employment taxes and quarterly payments
- Tracking deductible business expenses (mileage, supplies, phone)
- Separating business and personal bank accounts
- Basic invoicing and accounts receivable management
